DISTINGUISHED VILLA

In a production commissioned by the Finborough Theatre, Kate O'Brien's ground-breaking 1926 drama *Distinguished Villa* opens at the Finborough Theatre for a four week limited season on Tuesday, 6 September 2022 (**Press Nights: Thursday, 8 September 2022 and Friday, 9 September 2022 at 7.30pm**).

Brixton, 1926.

Mabel Hemworth rules her home and husband with a rod of iron. She expects others to follow her 'nice' example of domestic life. But this rule-bound world is turned upside down by the arrival of Frances, a new lodger who holds modern views about what life can offer. And Mabel's own sister, the mercenary Gwen, a typist obsessed with the cinema, has her own plans to escape.

Independence, romance and a life beyond stifling suburbia beckon. The consequences will be life-changing for everyone...

Both a humorous study of suburban manners and a serious look at the limits placed on young women in the roaring twenties, *Distinguished Villa* was the debut play of the distinguished Irish writer, **Kate O'Brien**, now rediscovered for a contemporary audience. When it premiered in the West End in 1926, the play was a hit despite being censored for its outspoken views.

Playwright **Kate O'Brien** (1897-1974) was working as a secretary in London when *Distinguished Villa* was first staged in 1926. It was the start of an immensely successful career as a playwright, novelist and travel writer which lasted fifty years. Born in Limerick City in 1897, O'Brien wrote other plays including *The Silver Roan, The Bridge* and *Set in Platinum,* but was best known as a writer of fiction. Her novel *Without My Cloak* (1931) won the 1931 James Tait Black Prize. It was followed by *The Ante-Room* (1934), *Mary Lavelle* (1936), *The Land of Spices* (1941), *That Lady* (1946) and *Music and Splendour* (1958). Following the pattern set in *Distinguished Villa,* O'Brien dealt with issues of female identity and empowerment, often in a subversive way. It is no coincidence that when in the film *Brief Encounter* (1945) Celia Johnson's stifled middle-class housewife visits a library to choose a book, she asks for 'the new Kate O'Brien'. The rebellious element to O'Brien's work is also apparent in the way she explored gay themes, something which led to some of her novels being banned in both Ireland and Spain.

Director **Hugh Fraser** has directed *Tiger Tail* (Drum Theatre, Plymouth), David Mamet's adaptation of *Uncle Vanya* (Wilton's Music Hall) and *Hamlet* (Royal Academy of Dramatic Art). He is best known as an actor, including playing

Captain Hastings in the television series *Agatha Christie's Poirot*, as well as extensive credits across theatre, film and television.
