# **MEN'S BUSINESS**

Following a sell-out run at Glass Mask Theatre in Dublin, the world premiere production of *Men's Business* by Tony and Olivier Award winner Simon Stephens opens at the Finborough Theatre for a four week limited season on Tuesday, 18 March 2025 (**Press Nights: Thursday, 20 March 2025 and Friday, 21 March 2025 at 7.30pm**).

A love story set in the back room of a butcher's shop with a brutal bastard of a dog howling in the yard next door.

Charlie's faith in the possibility of love can't be dimmed. No matter what deranged brutalities life throws at her.

Victor doesn't take his builder's boots off for dinner, has a rule to never go to a woman's flat in case she gets 'ideas', and doesn't like secrets...or dogs...

But could he be the one she's been waiting for?

Men's Business is the world premiere of Tony and Olivier Award winner Simon Stephens' new version of Franz Xavier Kroetz's rarely performed masterpiece Mannersache, and is also the London debut of acclaimed new company Glass Mask Theatre from Dublin, featuring actor **Rex Ryan** (multiple nominations for Best Actor Awards including Broadway World and the Manchester Theatre Awards).

Multi-award-winning playwright Simon Stephens is one of the UK's most prolific contemporary playwrights and his work is produced across the world. The author of more than twenty stage plays, he is a former tutor on the Royal Court Young Writers Programme. His many awards include the Olivier Award for Best New Play for On the Shore of the Wide World, and the Tony Award for Best Play for The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time and the Pearson Award for Best New Play for Port. Director **Ross Gaynor** is a theatremaker from Dublin. He is a graduate of the Lir Academy and University College Dublin where he received the Ad Astra scholarship for Drama.
